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News FAITH Webinar reaps positive response among online learners

AGBILARAN CITY - Due to the COVID-19 pandemic which resulted in the declaration of the Enhanced Community Quarantine starting March 16, 2020 to April 30, 2020, the Agricultural Training Institute-Regional Training Center 7 based in Cabawan District, this city re-aligned its extension delivery services to continuously serve clients across the region.

One of the modalities identified was the online learning through a WEBINAR on FAITH (Food Always in the Home) Gardening.

The webinar was done through a closed group via the center's official Facebook page and was implemented by a pool of staff that acted as administrators and resource speakers.

Since FAITH is a wide topic, the webinar was split into three (3) episodes and was aired on May 4, 7 and 21, 2020 respectively.

The first episode catered on the lecture-inputs by two (2) of the center's Agriculturists in the person of Joemelyn Allianic-Sumagang and Jeffrey O. Awas where they talked about the basics of FAITH, from steps 1 to 3 and steps 5 to 10 respectively, while Step 4 was done in Episode 2 by another licensed agriculturist, Arnel S. Navaro that focused on the demonstration of the fertilizer application and composting while Episode 3 talks about the Cultural Practices in the Garden with Joemelyn A. Sumagang and another licensed Agriculturist, Reynadez Lim-Curayag.

Nearly 250 participants joined the closed group webinar from the different parts of the country.

The webinar was successfully administered through the Information Services Section

Meanwhile, participants are also hopeful to learn about different composting methods that are applicable in a small garden/urban home settings and they are excited to learn more.

I want to help promote clean and green, and produce organic vegetables in my backyard while on community quarantine" said Henry Cantoneros, a displaced worker from Maribojoc, Bohol during the launching of GMOF on May 26, 2020 at the Carlos P. Garcia Park, this city.

Grow My Own Food project is a backyard garden contest designed for the youth, displaced workers and their families, aiming to showcase their gardening skills and ability to grow their own food naturally and sustainably to combat against this crisis. This collaborative effort is initiated by Origin Box, Dalareich, Kapunongan sa Bol-anong Organikong Mag-uuma (KBOOM), Bohol Association of Hotels, Resorts and Restaurants (BAHRR), and AGREA in partnership with the Provincial Government of Bohol through the Office of the Provincial Agriculturist (OPA) and the Agricultural Training Institute-VII (ATI-7).

Through its Plant Plant Plant Program, ATI-VII sponsored the participants with assorted seedlings, technoguides and vermicast, while the OPA gave away assorted seeds as the competitors' starter kits for the contest.

A total of 50 participants coming from the 1st District of Bohol participated in the event and it ran from May 26 to July 25, this year.

"We are happy to initiate this project together with our hardworking partners to help our fellow Boholanos in sustainable way especially this time of COVID-19 crisis. Grow My Own Food is one of the example of private-public partnership and collaboration during this difficult time. agbilaran City – it has been known that the threat of hunger is as real as the threat of COVID-19. The Department of Agriculture – Agricultural Training Institute (DA-ATI) in Central Visayas in collaboration with the Island City Mall (ICM) and Alay Marcela Foundation (AMF) - the corporate social responsibility arm of the Alturas Group of Companies (AGC) gave away technoguides, vegetables seeds as well as farm kits and set up IEC corner at ICM ground floor, Dao, this city. Fourteen (14) assorted vegetable technoguides were produced by ATI-7 while AMF provided 6 varieties of seeds, fertilizers and farm tools to affected tenants and employees of the AGC and its customers.

The IEC corner at the mall was set up for the easy access of technology on vegetable production by walk –in clients.

The pandemic is seen to be long term as stated by the World Health Organization,

thus this mechanism was implemented so food availability will be ensured.

ATI-7 and AMF believes that with the provision of technoguides and seeds support, city dwellers can also grow their own food right at their backyard or any space available at home.

In region 7 there are a total of 85 active FITS centers usually located where the City/Municipal and Provincial Agriculture Office (CAO/MAO/PAO) are.

Every FITS center was provided by ATI with necessary Information Communication Technology (ICT) equipment, as well as vegetables, crops and livestock technology production guides to give farmers and agriculture enthusiasts' easy access to information and technologies in farming.

In response to the COVID-19 crisis, these FITS Centers and MAOs/CAOs also provided seeds/seedlings to clients so food will be available at their homes and somehow help combat possible threat of hunger and be productive while on community quarantine.

As this developed, the City Government of Tagbilaran in collaboration with ATI-7 and Bohol Agriculture Promotion Center under the Department of Agriculture-7 distributed assorted vegetable seeds and information materials to the women's organization in the 15 barangays of the city. The partnership aims to promote urban gardening to mitigate the damaging effects of the COVID-19 outbreak.


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












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
